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As the One Earth Film Festival celebrates our third year, we are thrilled to bring thought-provoking, award-winning environmental films to more people than ever. This year, we will screen 30 films in 24 locations in Chicago, Oak Park, River Forest, and nearby communities. 

AMAZON GOLD

Directed By – Sarah Dupont/2012/53 minutes/Contains Heavy Themes

Narrated by Academy Award winners Sissy Spacek and Herbie Hancock, Amazon Gold is the disturbing account of a clandestine journey into the Amazon rainforest. Ron Haviv and Donovan Webster, two war journalists led by a Peruvian biologist uncover the savage unraveling of pristine rainforest. They bear witness to the apocalyptic destruction in the pursuit of illegally mined gold with consequences on a global scale.

BLACKFISH

Directed By — Gabriela Cowperthwaite/2013/90 minutes/PG-13/May be disturbing, especially to younger children

Many of us have experienced the excitement and awe of watching 8,000 pound orcas, or "killer whales," soar out of the water and fly through the air at sea parks, as if in perfect harmony with their trainers. Yet, in our contemporary lore this mighty black and white mammal is like a two-faced Janus-beloved as a majestic, friendly giant yet infamous for its capacity to kill viciously. Blackfish unravels the complexities of this dichotomy, employing the story of notorious performing whale Tilikum, who-unlike any orca in the wild-has taken the lives of several people while in captivity. So what exactly went wrong?

COMFORT ZONE

Directed By – Dave Danesh, Sean Donnelly, and Kate Kressmann-Kehoe/2013/67 minutes

What does climate change mean in a place where it's not an obvious threat? Where sea level rise isn't a factor, and frankly, where people might like it to be a little warmer? Three filmmakers set out to answer those questions for Upstate New York. The answers were not so simple.

THE CURIOUS GARDEN

Directed By - Weston Woods & Soup Nuts/Based on the award-winning book by Peter Brown/2010/10.5 minutes

One boy's quest for a greener world ... one garden at a time. A little boy named Liam discovers a struggling garden and decides to take care of it. As time passes, the garden spreads throughout the dark, gray city, transforming it into a lush, green world. "The Curious Garden" is an enchanting tale with environmental themes and breathtaking illustrations. Narrated by Katherine Kellgren, and music by David Mansfield.

DO THE MATH

Directed By — Kelly Nyles and Jared P. Scott/2013/44 minutes/Contains Heavy Themes It's simple math: we can emit 565 more gigatons of carbon dioxide and stay below 2°C of warming — anything more than that risks catastrophe for life on earth. The only problem? Burning the fossil fuel that corporations now have in their reserves would result in emitting 2,795 gigatons of carbon dioxide — five times the safe amount.

THE ECONOMICS OF HAPPINESS

Directed By – Helena Norberg-Hodge, Steven Gorelick/2011/69 minutes

Economic globalization has led to a massive expansion in the scale and power of big business and banking. It has also worsened nearly every problem we face: fundamentalism and ethnic conflict; climate chaos and species extinction; financial instability and unemployment. There are personal costs too. For the majority of people on the planet, life is becoming increasingly stressful. We have less time for friends and family and we face mounting pressures at work. The Economics of Happiness describes a world moving simultaneously in two opposing directions.

GMO OMG

Directed By - Jeremy Seifer/2013/90 minutes

★ Jim Slama, Family Farmed /Good Food Festivals will facilitate the Lake Theatre screening; Joan Levin, IL Right to Know GMO, will facilitate the Humboldt Park screening. GMO OMG director and concerned father Jeremy Seifert is in search of answers. How do GMOs affect our children, the health of our planet, and our freedom of choice? And perhaps the ultimate question, which Seifert tests himself: is it even possible to reject the food system currently in place, or have we lost something we can't gain back?

GREEN GOLD

Directed By – John D. Liu/2012/48 minutes

Environmental filmmaker John D. Liu documents large-scale ecosystem restoration projects in China, Africa, South America and the Middle East, highlighting the enormous benefits to people and planet of undertaking these efforts globally. This documentary is not just a tale of hope, it's evidence of hope — it's proof that we do not need to give in to apathy and despair. Instead, we see we have the simple solutions right in front of us.

GROWING CITIES

Directed By - Dan Susman/2013/60 minutes

★ Activists from the film will be present at this screening on Sunday, March 9.

In their search for answers, filmmakers Dan Susman and Andrew Monbouquette take a road trip and meet the men and women who are challenging the way this country grows and distributes its food, one vacant city lot, rooftop garden, and backyard chicken coop at a time. Join them as they discover that good food isn't the only crop these urban visionaries are harvesting. They're producing stronger and more vibrant communities, too.

HARMONY - A NEW WAY OF LOOKING AT OUR WORLD

Directed By – Stuart Sender/ 2012/90 minutes

Inspired by HRH The Prince of Wales, Harmony captures on film in a way we've never seen before, an authentic leader on critical global issues. For the better part of three decades, The Prince of Wales has worked side by side with a surprising and dynamic array of environmental activists, business leaders, artists, architects and government leaders. They are working to transform the world, address the global environmental crisis and find ways toward a more sustainable, spiritual and harmonious relationship with the planet.

JENS JENSEN THE LIVING GREEN

Directed By – Carey Lundin/2013/55 minutes

★ Filmmaker Carey Lundin along with Shaun Spikes of The Student Conservation Association will attend this screening.

This award winning documentary portrays how Danish-born Jens Jensen (1860 – 1951) rose from street sweeper, to 'dean of landscape architecture', to pioneering conservationist in troubled, early Chicago. At great risk to his family, he battles corruption and unbridled industrial expansion to bring 'the living green' into the wretched lives of Chicago's workers. Jensen leverages relationships with Frank Lloyd Wright, Julius Rosenwald, and Henry Ford to create a conservation fervor that stopped the steel mills from industrializing an entire Indiana shoreline.

THE LAST OCEAN

Directed By – Peter Young/2013/84 minutes

The Ross Sea Antarctica is the most pristine stretch of ocean on Earth. Scientists describe it as our last 'living laboratory', a place that can teach us about the workings of all marine ecosystems. But the fishing industry recently found its way to the Ross Sea, targeting Antarctic toothfish and unless stopped, the natural balance of this unique ecosystem will be lost forever.

LET'S TALK ABOUT SOIL

Directed By - Uli H. Streckerbach/2012/6 minutes

This animated film tells the reality of soil resources around the world, covering the issues of degradation, urbanization, land grabbing and overexploitation; the film offers options to make the way we manage our soils more sustainable.

LOST AND FOUND

Directed By — Philip Hunt/Based on the award-winning book by Oliver Jeffers//2008/24 minutes

Price Series Family Friendly! Children ages 3-9+

A magical tale of friendship and loneliness, Lost and Found tells the story of a little boy who finds a penguin on the doorstep of his house one morning. Although at first he is unsure about what to do, the boy becomes determined to help the penguin find his way back home, even if that means rowing a small boat all the way to the South Pole!

MIYA'S SUSHI

Directed By: Brandi Fullwood/2013/6 minutes


Miya's Sushi is a short film that showcases the use of invasive species in sushi, focusing on how the culinary arts impact environmental conscious.

MORE THAN HONEY

Directed By — Markus Imhoof/2013/95 minutes/Contains heavy themes and potentially disturbing Images

Over the past 15 years, numerous colonies of bees have been decimated throughout the world, but the causes of this disaster remain unknown. Depending on the world region, 50%

to 90% of all local bees have disappeared, and this epidemic is still spreading from beehive to beehive — all over the planet. Everywhere, the same scenario is repeated: billions of bees leave their hives, never to return. No bodies are found in the immediate surroundings, and no visible predators can be located. Should we blame pesticides or even medication used to combat them? Maybe look at parasites such as varroa mites? New viruses? Travelling stress? The multiplication of electromagnetic waves disturbing the magnetite nanoparticles found in the bees' abdomen? So far, it looks like a combination of all these agents has been responsible for the weakening of the bees' immune defenses.

MUSICWOOD

Directed By – Maxine Trump/2012/80 minutes

★ The screening includes refreshments and a mini concert for \$5 admission.

Musicwood is an adventure-filled journey, a political thriller with music at its heart. An unusual band of the most famous guitar-makers in the world (Bob Taylor of Taylor guitars, Chris Martin of Martin Guitars and Dave Berryman of Gibson Guitars) travel together into the heart of one of the most primeval rainforests on the planet. Their mission: to negotiate with Native American loggers and change the way this forest is logged before it's too late for acoustic guitars.

THE NEW ENVIRONMENTALISTS

Directed By – Will Parrinello/2013/28 minutes

Robert Redford narrates this multiple Emmy Award-winning series featuring inspiring portraits of passionate and dedicated activists. These are true environmental heroes who have placed themselves squarely in harm's way to battle intimidating adversaries while building strong grassroots support. The New Environmentalists share a common goal — safeguarding the Earth's natural resources from exploitation and pollution, while fighting for environmental justice in their communities.

PLASTIC PARADISE: THE GREAT PACIFIC GARBAGE PATCH

Directed By – Angela Sun/2013/82 minutes

Thousands of miles away from civilization, Midway Atoll is in one of the most remote places on earth. And yet its become ground zero for The Great Pacific Garbage Patch, syphoning plastics from three distant continents. In this independent documentary film, journalist/filmmaker Angela Sun travels on a personal journey of discovery to uncover this mysterious phenomenon. Along the way she meets scientists, researchers, influencers, and volunteers whom shed light on the effects of our rabid plastic consumption and learns the problem is more insidious than we could have ever imagined.


REVOLUTION

SACRED ECONOMICS

Directed By — Ian MacKenzie (Based on the book by Charles Eisenstein)/2012/12 minutes Sacred Economics traces the history of money from ancient gift economies to modern capitalism, revealing how the money system has contributed to alienation, competition, and scarcity, destroyed community, and necessitated endless growth. Today, these trends have reached their extreme — but in the wake of their collapse, we may find great opportunity to transition to a more connected, ecological, and sustainable way of being.

SAVING PELICAN 895

Directed By – Irene Taylor Brodsky/2011/40 minutes

Family Friendly! Children ages 10-14+

Nearly 9,000 birds were found in the oily waters of the Gulf Coast in the wake of the 2010 BP oil spill. One of them was a young pelican coated by oil near his nest in Louisiana. Saving Pelican 895 is the story of the 895th bird to be rescued and rehabilitated by a dedicated team of wildlife experts and every day people, many of whom travel the world responding to oil disasters. The tale of a single animal and the compassionate people deployed to save him, Saving Pelican 895 shows how the process of saving one life restored a degree of humanity for the rest of us.

THE SOIL SOLUTION

Directed By - Carol Hirashima, Jill Cloutier/2013/29 minutes

What if an answer to climate change was found beneath your feet? The Soil Solution explores the fascinating world of soil and documents the ranchers, farmers, and scientists who conserve, protect, and regenerate our natural resource. Healthy soil may provide a biologically-based, low cost solution to global climate change. We speak with those on the cutting edge of soil science who are ushering in a new system of farming and ranching that works with nature, instead of against it. These methods have the potential to provide us with nutritious food, improved health, cleaner water, and a healthier planet.

THE STORY OF SOLUTIONS

Directed By – Louis Fox/2013/9 minutes

The Story of Solutions, released in October 2013, explores how we can move our economy in a more sustainable and just direction, starting with orienting ourselves toward a new goal. In the current 'Game of More', we're told to cheer a growing economy — more roads, more malls, more Stuff! — even though our health indicators are worsening, income inequality is growing and polar icecaps are melting. But what if we changed the point of the game?

SUSHI: THE GLOBAL CATCH

Directed By – Mark Hall/2012/75 minutes

Sushi, a cuisine formerly found only in Japan, has grown exponentially in other nations, and an industry has been created to support it. In a rush to please a hungry public, the expensive delicacy has become common and affordable, appearing in restaurants, supermarkets and even fast food trailers. This hunger for sushi has led to the depletion of apex predators in the ocean, and to such a degree that it has the potential to upset the ecological balance of the world's oceans, leading to a collapse of all fish species.

TINY: A STORY ABOUT LIVING SMALL

Directed By – Merete Mueller and Christopher Smith/2013/62 minutes

★ Chicago-area film premiere!

What is home? And how do we find it? The film follows one couple's attempt to build a "tiny house" from scratch, and profiles other families who have downsized their lives into homes smaller than the average parking space. Through homes stripped down to their essentials, the film raises questions about good design, the nature of home, and the changing American Dream.

TOXIC HOT SEAT

Directed By – James Redford, Kirby Walker/2013/91 minutes

★ Discussion with Sam Roe, Tribune Pulitzer Prize winner & Tom Eblen, Fire Chief of Oak Park following film

Toxic Hot Seat follows a courageous group of firefighters and mothers, journalists and scientists, politicians and activists as they fight to expose a shadowy campaign of deception that left a toxic legacy in our homes and bodies — a campaign so cunning, it's taken nearly 40 years to unravel.

TRASHED

Directed By – Candida Brady/2012/97 minutes

Contains heavy themes, potentially disturbing images. Not recommended for children.

The multi-award winning documentary Trashed, starring Jeremy Irons, looks at the risks to the food chain and the environment through pollution of our air, land and sea by waste. The film reveals surprising truths about very immediate and potent dangers to our health. it is a global conversation from Iceland to Indonesia between the film star Jeremy Irons and scientists, politicians and ordinary individuals whose health and livelihoods have been fundamentally affected by waste pollution.

URBAN ROOTS

Directed By – Mark MacInnis/2011/93 minutes

Urban Roots is the next documentary from Tree Media. Produced by Leila Conners (The 11th Hour) Mark MacInnis and Mathew Schmid, the film follows the urban farming phenomenon in Detroit. Urban Roots is a timely, moving and inspiring film that speaks to a nation grappling with collapsed industrial towns and the need to forge a sustainable and prosperous future.

WATERMELON MAGIC

Family Friendly! Children ages 3-11+

Directed By – Richard Power Hoffmann/2013/38 minutes

International audiences will delight in this nearly wordless burst of color and music that draws inspiration from film classic "The Red Balloon". Weaving together documentary and narrative elements, "Watermelon Magic" chronicles a season on the family farm, as young Sylvie grows a patch of watermelons to sell at market. The film employs a dynamic visual style that uses high-resolution stills at varying shutter-burst frame rates with stunning time-lapse sequences to trace the journey from seed to flower to fruit. When harvest time arrives, Sylvie must decide if she will share her precious watermelon babies with the world.

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




















































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
